THE CORK BLACKWATER.

This most charming river, which, by means of a few miles land portage from Cappoquin to Newcastle on the Suir, may well be made the commencement of a long cruise in Ireland, is easily reached from England through Cork, to which steamers run from London, Southampton, Plymouth, Bristol, Newport, Cardiff, and Liverpool. From Cork it is 19 miles rail to Mallow on the Blackwater, the most convenient starting point, though canoes have, we believe, come down from Kanturk station, 13½ miles higher. If a canoeist has taken his boat to Killarney (p. 272), it may be well worth his while, on the return journey, to try the descent from Kanturk, at any time when the Irish rivers are fairly high. A pair-oared boat will scarcely get down from Mallow without a good deal of trouble, unless the water is a little over the average height, though it could generally do so from Fermoy.

The river is fast, but nowhere dangerous, for while some of the rapids are long, deep, and boisterous, they are not of the sort in which it is easy to make a mistake; in fact, in medium water, a canoeist need never get out of his boat except at Fermoy and Clondulane weirs. He had better reconnoitre Lismore Gap, though a good canoe can generally shoot it with

nothing more than a douche for the crew.

Its general course is about due E. to Cappoquin, where it meets the tide, and turning at a right angle runs due S. to the sea at Youghal. If the cruise is to end at Youghal, the boat should be taken outside of the river, when the sea is smooth enough, and landed on the beach right under the station, to avoid a long cartage through the narrow streets of the town. But, for a canoeist at least, even if he is returning to England at once, the better course is (unless he should happen to find a cargo boat in Youghal harbour bound to some convenient English port) to go back with the tide to Cappoquin, cart across to Newcastle-on-Suir, and go down the Suir to Waterford (p. 267). The 11 miles of cartage will save him transport to station at Youghal, 27 miles rail to Cork, and transport from Cork station to Penrose quay. And this last item in particular it is well worth while to be spared, for it brings one in contact with the most unpleasant set of people that the writer, in the course of a wide experience of that sort of business, has

ever encountered. At Waterford, on the contrary, the cruiser will either go straight alongside of his steamer, or can rely on the hospitality of the rowing club until she arrives.

If the Blackwater is taken as the last item in an Irish tour, the nearest point to it that can be reached by water is Limerick (p. 277), 40 miles by rail to Mallow, through Charleville.

Nature and art have done their best for this exquisite river, and made it rich in every variety of beauty, except grandeur. The scenery is not on a large scale, but fantastic rockwork, woodland wild and cultivated, verdant lawns, ruins of castles and abbeys at every turn, fast clear water, and rapids, as we

have said, just enough to add a spice of excitement without real danger either to the traveller or his boat, make up an ideal cruising river.
